



Gerhard Richter: Picture "Nine Objects" (1969)

The motifs "Nine Objects," each representing an extremely attractive image, were staged using self-built wooden objects.

Gerhard Richter presents them in various settings, in which elements of petit-bourgeois culture can be found, which seem to locate the arrangement in a domestic interior. Similar to Op Art, the perspective direction is often unclear for the "Nine Objects," as it is not always possible to unambiguously determine whether an object extends spatially to the foreground or the background.

Such games of confusion evoke associations with the optical illusions constructed by the Dutch artist M.C. Escher, which apparently can only be realised with artistic means. In an intelligent twist, Richter transports this familiar image theme into the present by replacing venerable graphic techniques with photographic manipulation and subsequent offset printing. Once again, he devotes himself to the border area between alleged realism and illusionism, which has always been the domain of art.
